


Matthew 1 v18-24

Mary pregnant? It's "certainly not my baby" Joseph must have thought – "I'm going to have to divorce her". But that night he dreamt - and an angel of the Lord spoke: "Do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.... He will save his people from their sins."

But immediately after the account of Joseph's dream, Matthew says something quite strange.

"All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet (Isaiah 7 v14) : "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel"

A prophecy made some 700 years previously, was going to be fulfilled in Jesus. Immanuel means, "God with us."

But what is its significance? What does it tell us about Jesus'? What does it mean to "us"?

These 8 verses in Matthew 1 tell us the story how Joseph learnt about his "special baby" and Luke 1 v 26-38 tell us how Mary learnt about the baby.

After the angel told Mary that she would have this baby, "How will this be, Mary asked the angel, since I am a virgin"?

The angel Gabriel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So, the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God."

Immanuel, "God with us," is to be understood *literally.* Although Jesus was Mary's human son, but, He was also God's Son - begotten by God himself – and He still is.

So, a few months later, when the shepherds and wise men worshipped Jesus in Bethlehem, they were worshipping the Son of God. Jesus was God and is God, and will be God forever.

Although we all may enjoy our festive celebrations, the real Christmas celebration is that God took on human flesh when Jesus was born. Jesus — God Himself — is Immanuel, God With Us.

John 1 v14. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

The Residents are enjoying their weekly Musical Chair Exercises with Patricia. Once a month our Day Club members are able to join in with the exercises and at 3pm they all deserve their tea and cake!!!

Trustee Message

Why are there workmen around Bridgemead?

Bridgemead is over thirty years old, and the building and equipment are getting worn. The Trustees intend to keep the home, your home, a pleasant and safe place to live. Over the last few years, we have replaced the boilers, redecorated the outside of the building, and refurbished the lift. This year we have modernised the fire alarm so if the alarm goes off, we will know exactly where it is **. The dining room has been poorly lit for many months, so we are going to replace the lights which have proved very unreliable. With advice from the fire service and our fire consultant, Fred Chappell has been improving the fire protection in the building so that in the unlikely event of a fire we will have more time to ensure everyone can be kept calm and safe. We've been busy!!

We would like to thank Fred who has been maintaining Bridgemead for the last 16 years. He has tackled many jobs, large and small and he knows the building and all its quirks well. Fred will be retiring when the fire protection work is complete. We do wish him a long and happy retirement.

Last month you may have seen a team around with clipboards and cameras poking into every corner of the building. They were doing a survey for planned maintenance over the next thirty years so we can maintain high standards and know when we will face big bills like replacing the windows. Yes, maintenance can be a bit annoying, but it keeps the home safe, homely, and attractive.

Planning projects can be quite challenging. What must be done? Do we have the resources? When is it needed? Will this be ready in time for that to be done? And so on. This made me think of God's plan for Christmas. Millenia ahead – the stars had to be in the right place to guide the astrologers to Bethlehem. Centuries ahead - His servants, the Old Testament prophets, had to prepare the people to receive the Saviour. Years ahead the Roman governor had to be appointed to issue the decree that sent Mary and Joseph trudging off to Bethlehem. Months ahead the angel had to be dispatched to make the announcements to Zechariah and Mary, and an elderly woman well past the menopause and a young woman without a husband both had to become pregnant. That week the generous-hearted inn keeper had to be ready to welcome an exhausted couple from a derided place up North (their accents would have given them away!) and let them use the animals' shelter. I could go on to talk about the plans for the rest of Jesus' life, they are amazing. Yes, Jesus' birth was no accident, it had been planned for the beginning of time. It was a major step in God's plan for salvation, so we have good reason to celebrate this Christmas!

** For those who are technically minded – we have installed an addressable fire alarm system using new technology which meant that we did not have to rewire the building. When a detector is triggered it sends its location to the display in the reception, unlike the old system which just indicated a zone containing several rooms.
