#### "Knowing what to believe."

"Do you not know? Have you not heard?" Isaiah 40:21 & 28

We live in a world today where it is difficult to know what or who to believe. Two years ago we had the Brexit referendum and it would now appear that both sides of the debate told us things that weren't true, either because they just hadn't thought the issues through or because they were fighting for our support. We have probably the most powerful man in the world who changes what he says by the hour let alone by the day. We have newspapers which feed us "fake news" and we don't know what to believe. For over a hundred and fifty years people have told us that the universe and people themselves have just happened, based on what is still only "The Theory of Evolution."

There is however a positive side to this; people believing wrong things is nothing new! In Isaiah chapter 40, written nearly three thousand years ago, we read very similar things and in response Isaiah says, "Do you not know? Have you not heard?" People prayed to and worshipped idols which other people had carved out of wood or perhaps even gold. They thought that in coming to these man-made objects something might happen in their lives, but Isaiah said, "Do you not know? Have you not heard? It is God who sits enthroned above the earth, it is God who made the earth and stretched out the heavens and put the stars and planets in place."

When the people complained their ways were hidden from God and that he disregarded their situations, Isaiah said, "Do you not know? Have you not heard? God is the everlasting Creator who never grows tired, who knows all about you and who is able to give you the strength for each day." When we are tempted to feel discouraged, let's remember the words of Isaiah and the truths that he tells us about a loving heavenly Father.


